Girls United is a Girl Guides of Canada initiative that promotes healthy relationships and prevents bullying. It was developed in 2007 with the support of PREVNet. Girls United consists of training for leaders and challenges for girls. The Girls United Challenge includes activities that Girl Guide units will use to promote healthy relationships and prevent bullying. These activities highlight the negative impact of social aggression and bullying, and create a sense of caring, belonging, and mutual responsibility between all girls. Girls are eligible to receive a challenge crest when they participate in these activities.
