PREVNet's New Book for Parents — "Bullying Prevention: What Parents Need to Know"

PREVNet's comprehensive new book <u>Bullying Prevention</u>: <u>What Parents Need to Know</u> takes an authoritative, research-based look at bullying and tells parents what they can do to prevent bullying at all age and school levels.

<u>Bullying Prevention: What Parents Need to Know</u> is written by PREVNet's Scientific Co-Directors, Wendy Craig and Debra Pepler, and Knowledge Mobilization Director Joanne Cummings, with contributions from more than a dozen PREVNet graduate students. It explores key myths such as the idea that children grow out of bullying, that only a small number of children have problems with bullying, and that reporting bullying will only make the problem worse.

The book provides age-specific advice on what to do when bullying occurs in preschool, elementary school, high school or in the form of cyber-bullying. Although it has just been published, the book is already earning rave reviews. Dr. Donald Meichenbaum of the Melissa Institute for Violence Prevention in Miami, FL says, "The suggested interventions will make schools and homes safer and improve relationship skills...KUDOS."

Dr. Susan Swearer, Co-Director of the Bullying Research Network at the University of Nebraska – Lincoln, calls the book "a gift for anyone wanting an authoritative, comprehensive and easily accessible guide to dealing with bullying." It is "informative and practical" and "a must read for educators and parents."

Knowledge Mobilization

Here's another update on more of PREVNet's Signature Knowledge Mobilization projects with the Networks of Centres of Excellence (NCE).

About Kids Health

The goal of this project is to populate <u>AboutKidsHealth</u>, the leading Canadian website providing children's health information, with evidence-based violence prevention and healthy relationship knowledge, strategies and tools for parents to improve parenting and child/youth wellbeing. Dr. Dale Stack and her team of five graduate students have generated two topics for parents (preschool aggression and preschool bullying) and these will be vetted in a series of parent focus groups this Spring in Ottawa.

Build Character Build Success

A website (http://buildcharacterbuildsuccess.ca/home.aspx) for this program has now been developed. This program is being implemented in schools in Toronto and Kingston and has been well integrated into school agenda and activities. Preliminary evaluation is ongoing in five schools.

MyHealth Magazine

Soon, MyHealth Magazine (http://www.myhealthmagazine.net) will launch a double issue, one for students and the other for teachers, with online tools created by PREVNet and MyHealth. These online resources aim to increase awareness about the impact of various forms of bullying on students and provide teachers with best-practice guidelines on how to intervene and address bullying among students who are victimized and students who bully others. MyHealth is providing free subscriptions for these materials. MyHealth also plans to launch a free phone app for Android and iPhone.

Rights Respecting Schools (RRS)

Dr. Pepler and a team of three graduate students and one undergraduate student have been working closely with UNICEF. They are focusing on strengthening the evaluation and measures for the RRS program. A professor in Quebec has been invited by UNICEF to participate in this project by conducting a literature review on evidence and principles of Child's Rights Education.

Youth Engagement

A full-day focus group was held with five PREVNet researchers, two graduate students and 17 NGO partners representing 11 youth-serving organizations with expertise with engaging youth. The focus group aimed to identify strategies to engage youth in PREVNet's activities and to generate creative ways to promote youth involvement in our NCE Knowledge Mobilization Key Signature Projects. PREVNet's next step is to create a National Youth Advisory Committee. Requests for nominations have been sent to all of our NGO partners and are due April 19.

HRSDC Showcase

When people ask "What are we going to do about bullying and promoting healthy relationships?", PREVNet now has another answer thanks to a Social Development Partnerships Program grant from Human Resources and Skills Development Canada.

That answer: "We have a number of new tools that will meet that need."

The grant wrapped up with a Showcase in Ottawa. Three years of concentrated work involving PREVNet, three partner youth-serving organizations and nine graduate students built a Community of Practice around healthy relationships and resulted in the co-creation of new tools including the Healthy Relationships Training Module (HRTM).

The key word is co-creation. The three organizations; Big Brothers Big Sisters of Canada, Canadian Red Cross and Scouts Canada shared their experiences, their training plans and their knowledge. Without that expertise, the training models would not be possible. Now the HRTM is being used across the country.

The organizations all praised the work of graduate students who evaluated their previous training plans and made suggestions in a 40 page report for each NGO. Those positive reports made resources more youth focussed and trainer friendly. Their evidenced-based foundation supports the training and policies and makes healthy relationships the focus.

Graduate students reported unexpected benefits as well. They welcomed the diversity that came to the table during work supported by the HRSDC grant. That diversity meant there were different perspectives that benefited all three organizations. The funding also allowed for a bridging of research and practice, leading to an innovative level of

knowledge mobilization. Equally as important, it also provided an excellent training opportunity for future professionals to build their skills.

In the end, the ones who will benefit most are children and youth. The tools and strategies co-created from the grant will have a broad impact across the country. There is a focus on healthy relations and everyone, from those in the head office to those working directly with children and youth, has the same information. But the work is not done. In fact, it is just beginning. The goal is to take the tools, strategies and knowledge co-created through the Community of Practice and disseminate them to every adult who interacts with children everywhere they live, learn, work and play. Through PREVNet and its 54 partners, there is the capacity to reach every child and youth in the country at least twice.

Partners

Researchers -

Dr. Claire Beaumont is a psychologist and Professor in the Faculty of Education at Laval University. She is the Research Chair on security and violence in educational settings, with a focus on interventions to prevent school violence and analyzing the types of behaviours that undermine the physical or psychological integrity of others. Dr. Beaumont is also a researcher at the Centre for Research and Intervention on academic achievement (CRIRES, which studies success and student retention and supports school communities in their efforts to promote the success of all students.



Dr. Alexandra Campbell is an Associate Professor of Marketing at the Schulich Business School, York University. Alexandra has an industry background in consumer packaged goods and worked in product management for Nestle and Reckitt and Colman. She has published articles in a number of academic journals about how and why firms cooperate and build trust in their working relationships. Alexandra's current research interest is on peer mentoring for anti-bullying support. She is specifically interested in how teenage girls use social media with their peers to help them cope with on-line and off-line bullying behaviours.



Dr. Amanda Cooper is a former secondary school teacher (Biology and English) and currently is an Assistant Professor in Educational Policy and Leadership at Queen's University. She specializes in Knowledge Mobilization (KMb) efforts to address research-practice-policy gaps across the education sector. Her interests professionally and academically revolve around improving research use in public services. She is the former program manager, research and KMb, of the Knowledge Network for Applied Education Research (KNAER), an ambitious effort to improve KMb in education across Ontario. Amanda also managed the Research Supporting Practice in Education program at OISE, from its inception in 2007-2012.



Dr. Wendy L. G. Hoglund is an Assistant Professor of Developmental Science at the University of Alberta. Wendy conducts basic and applied developmental research examining socio-cultural influences (e.g., peer relationships, relationships with teachers, classroom quality) of children's social-emotional development (aggressive behaviors, symptoms of depression and anxiety) and academic functioning (engagement, achievement). Her research focuses specifically on lowincome, ethnically diverse children during middle childhood and early adolescence.
