This year marks the 13th Anniversary of Bullying Awareness Week (Nov 16-22). It is amazing to think that when we started our bullying prevention research over 25 years ago there was very little awareness of the serious problems associated with bullying. The growing awareness, particularly with the emergence of cyberbullying, has put bullying in the spotlight and raised it as a serious concern for Canadians. Since 2006, we have led PREVNet (Promoting Relationships and Eliminating Violence Network), which is a national network of researchers and youth serving organizations working together to develop and disseminate tools and resources for parents and others involved with children and youth. To help celebrate the launch of Bullying Awareness Week, PREVNet is hosting a bullying prevention conference. CANADIAN RED CROSS FOR BULLYING AWARENESS WEEK November 16 – 20, 2015

The Respect Education program of the Canadian Red Cross will be training youth facilitators in the Beyond the Hurt program at the following schools; Central Peel Secondary School, H M Braithwaite Secondary School and St. John Chrysostom Catholic Elementary School. These youth facilitators will be great advocates for a bullying-free environment.

Healthy Youth Relationships will be launched nationally with immense engagement by youth across Canada. Utilizing a strength-based approach, the program highlights the powerful skill development for healthy relationships such as honest communication, inclusion and personal boundaries.

Respect Education will be working with UNICEF staff in Toronto on November 19th to learn about Workplace Bullying and Harassment as well as Personal Security in the Workplace. This training highlights that bullying is not solely a youth issue, and that awareness and prevention remain a necessary strategy.

Family Channel will have a special line-up of bullying prevention-themed programming and interviews with Family stars about bullying prevention, to be aired throughout Bullying Awareness Week, from November 16 – 22. Family will also air three Top 5 lists on bullying prevention from the cast of *Gaming Show (In My Parents' Garage)* made especially for Bullying Awareness. The Top 5 lists, along with an original music video written for Bullying Awareness Week featuring Shane Harte, were premiered at Family Channel's Stand UP! rallies in four schools across Canada during October. Team members represented PREVNet in leading student discussion about the Top 5 lists at the rallies: Jasprit in Etobicoke and Saskatoon, Cassandra in Moncton, and Megan in Calgary. PREVNet team members (Jeremy, Mary, Jasprit, and Wendy) have created a teacher's guide for using the Top 5 lists in classrooms. PREVNet team members (Mary, Jeremy, Ellen, Irene, Wendy, and Joanne) also developed a variety of activities that students can try for themselves or that teachers can use in class to introduce facts and vocabulary about bullying prevention. New Initiative from Kids Help Phone BroTalk: A support zone for teen guys

Teen guys are **19% less likely to discuss mental and emotional health issues** with Kids Help Phone and **23% less likely to discuss suicide** and suicide related issues than girls. Despite the need, teenage guys engage in high-risk behaviours and die by suicide more frequently than young women.

That's why, with generous support from the Movember Foundation, Kids Help Phone created <u>BroTalk</u>. BroTalk is a dedicated online support zone and referral service that provides guys with somewhere to reach out to when times are tough. Kids Help Phone created this new service with the guidance of teen guys themselves, basing the language and content on what matters most to them.


