conferences will take place in Edmonton, AB on November 24, 2014, in Winnipeg, MB on February 9, 2015, in Toronto, ON on February 24, 2015, and in Regina, SK on March 23, 2014. In addition to the large conferences we are also hosting a subject specific, fullday conference on Emergency Preparedness and Crisis Management in early December 2014, also located in Toronto, ON. Outside of professional development opportunities we are also holding our first ever Safe Schools story writing contest. We are calling for submissions from students in grades 4 to 8 to write about important safe schools issues happening in their schools. Stories will be judged by the Canadian Safe School Network and the top 2 winners will have their stories published in the first 'Canadian Safe School Story Book.' Finally, our ongoing resource "When Nobody's Listening" is a safe space online, where students, parents, and educators can ask questions anonymously, and have an expert reply with direction, encouragement, and assistance. Our Words Hurt PSA will be in the broadcast rotation during Bullying Awareness Week. In addition, @longlivekids will be tweeting throughout the week with links specifically to our bullying prevention PSAs and posters.

FAMILY CHANNEL marks its 12th annual Stand UP! Bullying Awareness Week campaign by promoting the message of bullying prevention with an entire week of dedicated programming. Two



special nights headline the week; on Wednesday, November 19 the network will air a marathon from fanfavourite series Jessie beginning at 6 p.m. ET/PT, featuring three back-to-back episodes reinforcing Family's Stand UP! message. Then, the stars of Family's hit series The Next Step host A Night to Stand UP! For on Friday, November 21 beginning at 6:30 p.m. ET/PT. After each new episode in the lineup the cast discusses the bullying behaviour displayed, shares their own personal stories about bullying and offer information and resources for viewers who are being affected by bullying. In advance of Bullying Awareness Week, Family Channel took the message of bullying prevention on the road, bringing Family stars to four elementary schools to host Stand UP! rallies. Each rally featured a sneak peek of a bullying-themed Austin & Ally episode followed by a discussion led by a PREVNet representative; plus, a quest speaker from a local organization was invited to give a presentation showcasing a community-related bullying prevention initiative for students. Footage from this year's Stand UP! Rally Tour, along with tips and resources prepared by PREVNet, are available on Family Channel and Family.ca as part of Bullying Awareness Week.

JOINT CONSORTIUM FOR SCHOOL HEALTH: THE MINISTRY OF ED OF BC. Through the ERASE (Expect



Respect and a Safe Education) Strategy, British Columbia will be continuing to train school staff and community partners in

bullying and violence prevention and intervention. As part of our regular communication with public and independent schools, the Ministry will be sharing information about Bullying Awareness Week 2014. During the week of Nov 16th to 22nd, we will highlight available resources and information that support student safety through our Twitter feed @ERASEbullyingBC. Students, parents, and the community will then have an opportunity to let us know what activities they are doing in support of Bullying Awareness week and what resources and information they find useful when it comes to keeping students safe. Also, the Ministry of Education will be selecting the ERASE BC student advisory candidates for the 2014/15 school year. Last year's advisory group consisted of 19 students from public, independent and First Nations school systems and together they co-created social media guidelines for schools and advised Premier Clark and Minister Fassbender on issues related to bullying and student safety. This year, the Student Advisory will be involved in the Student Ambassador Forum in Prince George on January 16, 2015 and events scheduled for Pink Shirt Day on February 25, 2015.

RCMP NATIONAL CRIME PREVENTION SERVICES. The RCMP is involved in two initiatives during Bullying Awareness Week:

- 1) We want to hear your story: The RCMP's National Crime Prevention Services is asking people to share their experiences: describe what happened to you, and, equally important, what you did about it. How did you make the bullying stop? Or, why, if you were the person doing the bullying, did you stop? Selected entries will appear on the Centre for Youth Crime Prevention website during Bullying Awareness Week.
- 2) RCMPTalks. The RCMP is embarking on an innovative way of interacting with Canada's youth by hosting national conversations from their very own classrooms. RCMPTalks is a series of 90-minute live, interactive videoconferences that offers advice and guidance on important issues, such as Bullying and Cyberbullying. Each conversation allows students from up to six schools participate Canadian to videoconference and social media, where they can pose questions to designated quests. The delivery of each videoconference includes a secured virtual classroom with learning activities and resources for teachers to deliver to their students over a period of 1 to 2 weeks leading up to the national event. During this phase, a team of online mentors will provide students with timely feedback on their virtual classroom postings. The next RCMPTalks session will be "A national conversation on Bullying and Cyberbullying" is scheduled November 19th, 2014.
