

## Back to School tips, tools and resources from PREVNet



#### **FAMILY CHANNEL LAUNCHES STAND UP! CAMPAIGN**

As summer vacation comes to an end, Family Channel gets ready for back-to-school with the launch of its 11<sup>th</sup> annual Bullying Awareness Week campaign. Family is spreading the message to Stand UP!, not stand by when you see bullying happen and this fall offers an abundance of bullying-themed programming, special messages and events designed to help students do just that.



Earlier this month Family Channel released the campaign's new original anthem "Stand Up and Shout." The music video features stars from Family's hit dance series *The Next Step,* and encourages bullying bystanders to intervene when they witness bullying behaviour. At first, the dancers are seen dancing alone but as the song progresses the group comes together to have a stronger impact, mirroring the importance of working together to put an end to bullying. The pop song's chorus features lyrics that kids and their families can sing and dance along to, and in the coming weeks an instructional dance-along version of the music video's chorus will be released on Family Channel, enabling viewers to join the Stand UP! movement.

Similar to past years, Family Channel is going on the road to bring the message of bullying prevention to schools across Canada. Students can enter to win one of three Stand UP! rallies, hosted by Family stars Brittany Raymond (Riley, *The Next Step*) and Trevor Tordjman (James, *The Next Step*) who will teach the entire school the "Stand Up and Shout" dance. Each rally will also include an interactive discussion led by a representative from PREVNet. Students can enter to win a rally by visiting <a href="Family.ca">Family.ca</a> and explaining how they Stand UP! to bullying in their community. The contest runs until 5:00 p.m. ET on Friday, October 4.

This year's national Bullying Awareness Week takes place from Monday, November 18 to Sunday, November 24. All week-long, Family will air special bullying-themed episodes from popular series like *Good Luck Charlie, Wizards of Waverly Place* and *Wingin' It* with a special *Jessie* marathon and a brand new episode of *The Next Step* on Friday, November 22 beginning at 5 p.m. ET/PT. A special edition of the "Stand Up and Shout" music video featuring exclusive footage of the participants from the Stand UP! rallies will also debut during the week.

# Lions Quest Canada – The Canadian Centre for Positive Youth Development's Response to Bullying

According to PREVNet, Canada's national network of leading researchers and organizations, working together to stop bullying in Canada, "Bullying is a form of abuse at the hands of peers that can take different forms at different ages. It is targeted and repeated. It involves power, aggression, intimidation and shame. It preys on vulnerability and exposes both children who bully, and those who are bullied, to a number of social and mental health problems and a lifetime pattern of abuse. Any abuse - in particular the kind of abuse that can lead a child to contemplate suicide - is anything but harmless." Lions Quest Canada is one of the original community partners of PREVNet.

How do we stop this bullying behaviour that seems to have reached epidemic proportions? At Lions Quest Canada we support caring adults who teach kids from day one that looking out for one another, being empathetic, being responsible for another's well-being and treating others as we would like to be treated is the norm. We support teaching children that threatening, mean behaviours or excluding others will not be tolerated. That it is not funny, fair or productive to pick on each other to gain power and that the gifts and sparks that make us unique are things to be celebrated and encouraged, not personal traits to be ridiculed and repressed.

We advocate for the teaching and modelling of positive behaviours for our children in our homes, their preschools, their classrooms, their activities and their communities. We support parents who are looking for positive ways to raise their young children. We work with preschool professionals who teach children how to fill each other's buckets every day with positive actions and that taking from someone else's bucket or 'bucket dipping' is not right. We help our young people build positive values, social skills and positive identities in our schools by providing them with support, opportunities for empowerment, boundaries and expectations, and constructive use of time.
